Latin CAPERE, CAPTUM, "to seize, take, get"

III Note: Now that you

know "fic" (from Unit 1) (1) CAPACITY (ka'pās̄tē) n. An ability, potential is just another form of "fac," it will be easy to remember that "cip" is another form of "cap."

Dave didn't have the capacity to forgive his sister after all the teasing she put him through.

syn: power

CAPTIVATE (kā'p̄ətāv'ēt) v. To interest greatly; to charm. Cute puppies captivated the artist so much that they were the only thing he ever painted.

syn: fascinate

RECIPIENT (rē'sip'ēnt) n. A person who gets something.

(L. re, "back," + capere = get back)

Elizabeth was thrilled to be the recipient of the front-row ticket to the show.

Root PREHEND

Latin PREHENDERE, PREHENSUM, "to seize, to grasp, to take"

APPREHEND (ap'rehend') v. To seize; to arrest.

(L. ad, "upon," + prehendere = to seize upon) The escaped bank robber was quickly apprehended when he tried to steal a police car.

syn: capture

COMPREHEND (kom prē'hend') v. To understand; to catch or seize; if you feel apprehensive, you are seized by doubt or worry about something yet to come.

(L. com, "with," + comprehendere = to seize with (the mind)) No matter how much he studied, Mel could not comprehend any foreign language.

syn: get, grasp

Root RAPT, RAP

Latin RAPERE, RAPITUM, "to seize"

ant: mistake

Also Shady:

Fac, Fic, Fact = to wake, do

Act, Ad = to do, drive

Drep = to worse

Fund = to work, perform

Pos, Pone = to put, place

Root SUM, SUMPT

Latin SUMERE, SUMPTUM, "take, use up, buy"

III To assume is to take something for granted; it can also mean "to put on or take up." If the captain of your volleyball team is hurt, you can assume that he or she will get better, but you can also assume the role

ASSUMPTION (ə sum' shən) n. A belief accepted as true (1) Ed made the false assumption that he could outrun his father in a long race.

CONSUME (kən sūm'əs) v. To use up, devour.

(L. con, intensifier, + sumere = to take towards (oneself)) How could the Smiths consume so much electricity when their air conditioner never runs?

syn: go through

ant: save

PRESUMPTUOUS (prē zamp' chōōs) adj. Having too much confidence

(L. pres, "before," + sumptum = to take in advance) It was presumptuous of Gary to think I was his friend simply because I agreed with him about the movie.

syn: forward

SUMPTUOUS (sūmp' chōōs) adj. Very luxurious or rich.

Ted thought the meal of steak and lobster was sumptuous, but his date felt it was overly fancy and cost too much.

syn: magnificent

ant: humble

Root RAPT, RAP

Latin RAPTURE, RAPITUM, "to seize"

III The Latin verb "sumere" means both "to take" and "to buy, spend sumptuously usually takes a great deal of money on." Something

RAPTURE (rap'ücher) n. A state of intense joy.

Few things compare to the rapture little Emily feels when her father reads her

syn: bliss

ant: misery

RAPIDITY (ra pid' i tē) n. Speed, quickness

Sally had no trouble understanding the teacher, even though he went through the

syn: hurry

ant: slowness
